Summer water conservation program

Note: further restrictions may occur with excessive water use or when dry conditions cause water shortages

May 1 - September 30, 2025

Oxford County relies entirely on groundwater for its water supply. Compared to other communities near rivers or lakes, groundwater supplies take much longer to replenish and are more vulnerable to overuse.



Oxford County By-law No. 4193-2002 permits outdoor water use (by hose or attachment) every other day to ensure an adequate water supply for all residents.

What to flush



Help prevent problems in your pipe by flushing only the 3 Ps: pee, poo and paper.

Sewage backups and overflows can damage properties and create environmental and health hazards. Cleanup and repairs are unpleasant and expensive, and the property owner is usually responsible for covering the costs.

Food and grease clogs drains, sending wastewater back up through your plumbing. Oxford County offers free grease collection cups to residents. Once full, they can be added to your garbage bin. Pick yours up at any Oxford County Library branch, the Waste Management Facility, or the Oxford County Administration Building.

Chemicals, paints, motor oils and other pollutants are dangerous and don't belong in our sewers. Take these materials to one of the Oxford County hazardous disposal centres instead:

Approximately 3 metres of unflushable materials were removed < from the Woodstock Wastewater Treatment Plant last month. Any wipes, whether they are labelled flushable or not, can damage pumps, grinders and other equipment.

Spring/fall watermain maintenance

With 100% groundwater as Oxford County's drinking water source, mineral build-up in the water distribution system is common. Regular watermain flushing and swabbing helps maintain drinking water quality by removing build-up and mineral deposits in the distribution system.

Oxford County flushes and swabs watermains twice a year. Please check online information for Woodstock and Tillsonburg.



The full maintenance schedule is posted online approximately one month in advance at oxfordcounty.ca/watermainflushing

AFTER

Getting ready for watermain flushing

BEFORE

• Complete tasks that use tap water in advance (i.e., showering, laundry).

Set aside tap water for drinking, cooking and other household uses.

DURING

Avoid using water to prevent drawing discoloured water into your pipes.

If you experience discoloured water, run cold water for 10 minutes or until the water runs clear. This could be done from an outside tap or laundry faucet if not connected to a water softener or filter. Tip: You can continue to use your garden hose to water your lawn or garden while completing this step.

Resume normal use.
